WASTEWATER PROJECT GETS BIG EXPANSION

The virtually drought-proof program is touted as the largest of its kind in the world

Orange County's wastewater recycling program, a pioneer-ing idea that's already touted as the largest of its type in the world, is about to get bigger. Big enough, in fact, to serve

the tap water needs of about I million residents, according to the Orange County Water Dis-trict and Orange County San-itation District. Dubbed the Groundwater Replenishment System, the project produces water that is half the price of imported water, and is virtu-ally immune to both drought

and reductions in imports. The water and sanita-tion districts, partners in the Il-year-old project, hosted a groundbreaking ceremony Friday to celebrate its expan-sion. The Fountain Valley event drew about 250 local, state and federal officials, consultants and employees. Actual con-struction is scheduled to begin next week and be completed in PROJECT » PAGE 8

molesting 17 boys Costa Mesa man faces 33

counts of abusing kids as young as 2-years-old

A male nanny who worked for families across Southern Califor-nia is now accused of abusing 17 children who were in his care, in-cluding molesting boys as young as two years old, the Orange County District Attorney's Office

announced Friday. Matthew Antonio Zakrzewski, 30, of Costa Mesa is now facing 33 felony counts, including lewd and lascivious acts with a minor, oral copulation of a child and posses-sion of child pornography.

sion of child pornography. Zakrzewski's attorney, Mat-thew B. Wallin, said his firm is in-vestigating the allegations, and he could not comment until the re-view of the evidence is completed. According to prosecutors, Zakrzewski – who describes NANNY » PAGE B
